

National Grass Seed Feedback Report Model B

Carcases from this consignment of lambs (PIC Number, Trading Name, contract/consignment number) processed today at *REALLY GOOD MEAT COMPANY* were contaminated with seeds.

Carcases are considered seed contaminated, as judged by *Really Good Meat Company* assessors, if there is sufficient grass seed to cause trimming to product or disruption to processing throughput. Disruption may include increased labour requirements, slowing of the processing chain or movement of the carcases to the retain rail (where further processing is required).

REALLY GOOD MEAT COMPANY has provided photos of example carcases from your consignment with this feedback report.

NOTE: Grass seeds are trade access risk to Australia's lamb export markets and may have reduced the growth potential of your lambs.

In this reporting sheet

- carcases that have grass seeds but they are easily removed in the normal trimming process are not considered to have reportable grass seed contamination
- carcases that are sent to the retain rail because of grass seed contamination or any carcases that requires additional trimming for grass seed contamination are regarded as having grass seed contamination.

If grass seed only occurs in the belly and flank then it is regarded as *low levels* of contamination.

If grass seed only occurs in the belly, flank, shoulder and brisket then it is regarded as *medium levels* of contamination

If grass seed occurs in the flank, brisket, shoulder, leg/loin then it is regarded as *high levels* of contamination.
